

HORTICULTURAL JUDGING CRITERIA

Anyone judging classes at this show may NOT enter any Horticultural, Special Exhibits or Design class on either entry day.

The following rules apply to all classes at this show:

1. All Design, Horticultural and Special Exhibit entries will be judged by a designated team of judges selected by the Toronto Flower Show Convenors.
2. Judges at this year's show will not be permitted on the show floor during entry times for exhibits.
3. No one other than those authorized by the Show Committee will be permitted into the area of the Toronto Flower Show where judging is in progress and no one may discuss the exhibits with the judges prior to judging.
4. Designs and Special Exhibits must not be altered in any manner after judging. Deteriorating plant material however, must be replaced in order to keep the exhibit in show condition.
5. In Horticultural classes, no further subdivisions may be made, once judging commences.
6. The decision of the Judges is final.

HORTICULTURE & SPECIAL EXHIBIT COMPETITION RULES

Regulations and judging standards

1. General Regulations (pages 7,8), Judging Criteria (page 9) and *The Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design*, 2003 edition, (OJES) will govern.

Possession

2. *All plants exhibited must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least 3 months prior to March 10, 2017, except in classes 19, 20, 25 and 28 - 35 inclusive. All bulbs and branches must be forced by exhibitor in classes 18-20 inclusive.*

Forms

3. Horticulture and Special Exhibit Registration Forms and Entry Forms are available at the Garden Club of Toronto monthly meetings or at the Canada Blooms Offices. They are also available on line at canadablooms.com and may be downloaded or filled out online. All

completed forms must be legible, accurate and neatly printed in BLOCK LETTERS.

- a) **Registration Forms** must be received by the Registrar by Monday March 6, 2017. Please email forms to cbentries@hotmail.com. Registration forms may also be mailed or faxed to either the Canada Blooms office or the Garden Club of Toronto office, however, email is preferred. See back cover for information on addresses and numbers.

Special Exhibits must be pre-registered with the listed class convenor. Pre-registration of horticultural entries is strongly encouraged but not required (it is faster to delete an entry on entry day than to enter new data). Exhibitors may register any additional entries in the horticultural classes on site on ENTRY DAY.

- b) **Entry Forms** must be printed clearly and include the exhibitor's name, class number and plant names/lists using both botanical and common names of specimens where applicable. Entry forms accompany exhibits on entry day. The entry card on display during the show is prepared from the information provided on this form.

Entries

4. Exhibitors may have up to **THREE entries per class in the Horticulture Division**, as long as they are different species or cultivar of a species. **Exhibitors may have only ONE entry per class in the Special Exhibits Division.**
5. **Exhibitors may have no more than 30 entries in total.** Each entry must be accompanied by its own **Entry Form.**
6. **Plant lists:** If you are entering a class which permits two or more species or cultivars, (classes 21, 26 and 28-35 inclusive), you must include a plant list on index card stock, 10 x 15cm (4"x 6") in addition to the plant list on the entry card. Both lists must include botanical and common names.
7. Should the exhibitor require the watering/ grooming committee to care for an exhibit during the show, the exhibitor must attach instructions including watering requirements and any special needs to the entry form. The water/grooming committee will be notified of these needs.
8. For all horticultural classes and Special Exhibits (except classes, 29, 33, 34, and 35), an exhibitor may enter the same class on the 1st and 2nd entry day, provided their entry/entries are completely different species or cultivars in horticulture or different designs in Special Exhibits. For classes calling for multiple species or cultivars, e.g. Class

26, the 2nd entry day may not include any of the species or cultivars in the exhibitor's 1st day entry in that class.

9. Where a class exists for a special type or variety of specimen, a specimen entry must be exhibited in that class, e.g. ferns must be exhibited in a fern class. Class 22 Novice class and classes 24, 25 and 26 are exempt from this rule.
10. In classes 1 to 17 inclusive and classes 22 to 27 inclusive, there may be one or more plants in each pot if of the same cultivar. Saintpaulia (African violet) is the exception, where only the trailing type or species are allowed to have multiple crowns. See OJES.
11. **No accessories are permitted in horticultural classes** unless otherwise stated. **Accessories are permitted in all special exhibit classes.**
12. Topdressing is not mandatory but may be used at the discretion of the exhibitor and where appropriate. Unobtrusive staking is permitted in horticultural classes. No "training rings" are permitted for Saintpaulia (African violet) exhibits.
13. Entry Days/Times

First Day entries: Wednesday, March 8, 2017

Hours: 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Second Day entries: Tuesday, March 14, 2017

Hours: 6:00 PM to 8:00 p.m.

NOTE: entries will be registered from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM, but will be placed on the floor after 7:30 PM when Day 1 entries are removed. For classes 29-34 inclusive, or other Special exhibit classes requiring prep time on the show floor, entrants must be registered by 8:00 PM but may continue to work until 10:00 PM

Please note that ALL CLASSES (with the exception of Classes 29, 33, 34 and Class 35) **have 2 ENTRY DAYS**

Classification

14. A member of the Classification Team must initial each **Entry Form** before the exhibitor places the exhibit on the show floor.
The Classification Team may, at its discretion, refuse to accept an entry if it is not considered to be of show quality, or not free from pests and disease.
15. **Please Note:** No competitors will be allowed to groom or water their entries after they are placed on the show floor until judging has been completed. The Show Committee may allow exhibitors to cover their entries if temperature and/or dust conditions would damage plants. Covers will be removed before judging by members of the Show Committee and replaced shortly thereafter.

Staging

16. The Show Committee may subdivide horticultural classes and may move or remove horticultural entries if necessary before judging commences.
17. All exhibits must be kept in show condition. Exhibitors are responsible for maintaining and watering their entries AFTER JUDGING HAS TAKEN PLACE, unless they have notified the Horticultural Chair. See Rule 7. Plant material must be kept fresh for the duration of the show. Work may be done any time during the show, including public open hours.

Judging

18. Judging Dates/Times

First Day: **Thursday, March 9, 2017, 1:00 p.m.**

Second Day: **Wednesday, March 15, 2017, 9:30 a.m.**

NOTE: Anyone judging Horticultural, Special Exhibit or Design competitions at the 2017 show will not be permitted to enter any Horticultural, Special Exhibit or Design competitions at this show.

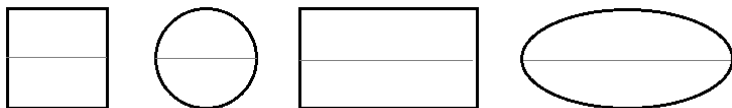
Removal

19. Exhibitors are responsible for and must remove their exhibits according to the schedule listed below.
All classes entered on First Entry Day must be removed Tuesday, March 14, 2017 between 7:30 and 8:00 p.m.

All classes entered on Second Entry Day must be removed Sunday, March 19, 2017 between 5:00 and 5:45 p.m.
20. No boxes or other removable containers are permitted on the show floor prior to removal times as set out above.

Pot Size

21. Pot size refers to the inside measurement of the container, at the top, in which the plant is grown. Measure along the slim lines as shown in the following diagrams.



HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE HORTICULTURAL COMPETITIONS

Please check *Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design*, 2003 edition, also known as OJES.

The following are a few of the criteria the judges take into consideration when judging:

- When there is more than one specimen of the same cultivar in an entry, the judge looks for uniformity in size, form, colour and stage of development as well as cultural perfection.
- Freshness of material, along with the proportion of the stem to the cultivar and condition of the foliage, where applicable, are looked at carefully.
- Floriferousness refers to the abundance of flowers on the entire plant. The quality of colour and size as well as the number of flowers, is of importance.
- Good condition and grooming are important, and all entries must be free of pests and disease. Any damaged foliage should be carefully removed so that it does not affect the overall appearance of the exhibit.
- It is important for the exhibitor to check in *Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design* (2003 edition), for the Scale of Points for each type of exhibit, e.g. Flowering Branches have a Scale of Points that is quite different than that for Cacti and other Succulents. By checking in this publication, you could end up with the winning entry! It is really a “must do”.
- Saucers of compatible material should be brought with potted plants and placed under them for drainage.
- Reference books that might be of assistance are:

- **Remember to read your schedule carefully – it is the law of the show.**

Horticultural and Special Exhibit Entries 2017

You will need to complete two types of forms, available from Garden Club of Toronto monthly shows, or downloaded from either the Garden Club of Toronto website: www.thegardencluboftoronto.ca, or the Canada Blooms website: www.canadablooms.com.

1. Horticultural & Special Exhibit Registration Form (1 per exhibitor)

This form may be completed and submitted for pre-registration by March 6, 2017, or you may register on-site during the entry times. The form must contain the exhibitors' name and club affiliation, if any. This form lists all the entries you are submitting for both entry days. A copy of this form will be available at the registration desk on the show floor, and this information will have been entered into the show database if you have pre-registered. All Special Exhibit entries must have been pre-registered. On entry days, you must notify the Entries Convenor in the Hort office of any horticultural entries that are added or deleted. See pages 9 and 10 for information about registration, and forms.

Entry Form (1 per entry)

This form must be attached to each entry and is not to be pre-submitted. It allows the show committee to identify the owner of each plant or entry until the printed forms are completed from our database. If you are entering an "Exhibit" in Section F, G, or H you must attach a printed list of plants with both botanical and common names to your entry. This must be on a 10cm (4") x 15cm (6") card, or on paper that can be cut to fit the holders placed on the show floor with your entry.

NOTE: These forms may be copied from the form inserted in the schedule or downloaded from the website www.canadablooms.com. Also, they will be available on the entry days at the Registration tables.

If you have more than 10 entries, please arrive at least one hour and a half prior to the close of entries on Wednesday March 8, 2017 and Tuesday March 14, 2017. No entries will be allowed after that time.

Exhibitors may enter the show floor any time after 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday March 8, 2017 to begin preparing their entries, but entries will not be classified or accepted until 4:30 p.m.

2. Class Eligibility

- There are two days for most classes, unless otherwise noted. See Horticulture and Special Exhibits Competition Rule #8, page 10
- **Sections A, B, and C** are open to all interested non-professional exhibitors and all members of horticultural societies and garden clubs including the Garden Club of Toronto.
- **Sections D, E, F and G** are limited to members of the Garden Club of Toronto.

Section H is open to all interested non-professional exhibitors and all members of horticultural societies and garden clubs other than the Garden Club of Toronto.

See *Horticulture and Special Exhibit Rule #12*. Orchids may be staked, but stake should be unobtrusive. Orchids may be grown in any medium e.g. sphagnum moss, bark, etc., and may be top dressed. Plants may not be treated with dye.

SECTION C FORCED BULBS AND BRANCHES

Open classes

Exhibits in Classes 18, 19, 20 must have been forced by exhibitor, class 18 must have been cut from exhibitor's garden.

Class 18 Flowering Branch 1 branch not to exceed 90cm (35.5") in length (measured from the top of the vase shown in exhibitor's own container. State date when cut.

Class 19 Hardy flowering bulbs or corms (E.g. Tulip, Narcissus, Muscari, Crocus, Hyacinth etc.) 1 cultivar, minimum 5 shown growing in a single container.

Class 20 Non Hardy flowering bulb(s) or corms (E.g. Amaryllis, Paper Whites, Calla Lilies.) 1 cultivar, shown growing in a container in soil or water

NOTE: Only *Hippeastrum* (Amaryllis) may be a single bulb. Other smaller bulbs or corms must have at least 3 specimens.

SECTION D EDUCATION

Limited to members of The Garden Club of Toronto

Class 21 A collection of cut hardy specimens which provide winter interest, shown in exhibitor's own container. Specimens must have been cut in March 2017 from the exhibitor's own garden and may include branches, evergreens, conifers, perennials, ornamental grasses etc. Minimum 5 different kinds.

State date cut. A list of common and botanical names on a 10cm x15cm (4" x 6") card must accompany the entry.

Staged: on a pedestal, dimensions 30cm (12in) x 30cm (12in) x 91cm (36in) high, viewed from all around

Class 23 Pelargonium over wintered indoors 1 cultivar, pot any size

Class 24 **Parent & Child** – Parent and child plants to be exhibited together, in separate containers, pots any size. New plant (child) started from cutting or stolon (not from seed or crown division). State date when propagation was started.

Class 25 **New Beginnings** – A plant(s) started from a part or seed of an edible fruit or vegetable (kitchen scraps), shown growing in either soil or water. State date when propagation was started. (E.g. carrot top, avocado pit, grapefruit, pineapple top etc.)

Class 26 **Family Connections** - 2 different species or cultivars from one plant family, growing in separate pots, pots any size. Note plant family on accompanying card. (E.g. *Monstera deliciosa* (Swiss Cheese plant) & *Spathiphyllum wallisii* (Peace Lily) both belong to the Araceae family. *Codiaeum* (Croton) and *Euphorbia pulcherrima* (Poinsettia) are in the Euphorbiaceae family.)

Limited to 4 entries.

Staged: on pedestal 61cm wide x 61cm deep x 76cm high (24" x 24" x 30") set on a base 91.5cm wide x 91.5cm deep x 10cm high (36" x 36" x 4") against a background 91.5cm wide x 183cm high, (36" x 72") and viewed from front.

Staged: Hanging on a door painted Red 2000-10*. Door dimension: approximately 76cm (30") to 81cm (32") wide x 203cm (80") high. Hook on door at approximately 178cm (70") from base of door. Exhibit not to exceed door dimensions.

Staged: on a 5cm (2") high base, in front of a door, but offset to one side. Door painted Red 2000-10*. Door dimensions: approximately 76cm (30") wide to 81cm (32") wide x 203cm high (80"). Base dimensions: 122cm wide x 91.5cm deep x 5cm high (48" x 36" x 2") Colour of base: 2121-10 Grey*

Area Allotted: 61cm x 61cm (24" x 24"). Height unlimited.

Class 33 Trans Canada A crate planted with rooted material with cut flowers and/or foliage. Any other plant material, fresh and/or dried may be included. Materials may hang over the edge of the crate or be attached to the sides but may not be separate from the crate.

Limited to 5 Entries. Each entry may be created by 1 or 2 people.

Staged: Exhibit staged on a crate on a flat rail car painted black at 91.5cm (36") high. Crate viewed straight on from the long side for judging.

Approximate crate dimensions: 45cm long x 32cm wide x 24cm high (17 7/8" x 12 1/2" x 9 5/8")

Crate may be painted, stained or sealed; no other changes to crate permitted. Crate to be lined or prepared in such a fashion that no moisture leaks from the crate on to the staging set. Crate will be provided ahead of time to exhibitor through convenor.

Area Allotted: 91.5cm x 91.5cm x 10cm (36" x 36" x 4"), height unlimited.

Class 35 **Coast to Coast** A crate planted with rooted material with cut flowers and/or foliage. Any other plant material, fresh and/or dried may be included. Materials may hang over the edge of the crate or be attached to the sides but may not be separate from the crate.

Limited to 5 Entries. Each entry may be created by 1 or 2 people.

Staged: Exhibit staged on a crate on a flat rail car painted black at 91.5cm (36") high. Crate viewed straight on from the long side for judging.

Approximate crate dimensions: 45cm long x 32cm wide x 24cm high
(17 ⁷/₈" x 12 ¹/₂" x 9 ⁵/₈")
