Edibles, trees and colour are in for 2015

"In gardens this spring, there will be food, there will be fantasy, there will be fragrances, there will be fun and there will be flowering shrubs."

Food

- With the local food movement continuing to gain traction, growing edibles will be more popular than ever. Vegetables, herbs and fruits can be grown in gardens, containers, pots or raised beds. And this is the time of year to start planting. With a mini-greenhouse kit, you will have seedlings ready to transplant when the weather warms. Consider giving various herbs, chic peas and red radishes a try!
- If you grow it you have to cook it! Look for many landscape designs to include outdoor kitchens and dining areas.

Fantasy

• What people are looking for this year is something unusual. Denis expects hydrangeas will likely be the No. 1 flower this year, with may new varieties coming to market.

Fragrance

• The aromas from flowers will be very big in 2015. Rather than quantity, be selective and pick a few plants that are interesting and fragrant.

Fun

• We often talk about the benefits of getting children involved in gardening – it is good for their health, gets them outdoors and even teaches responsibility while giving them something fun to do.



• But this year, fun will also come in colours. Not just the flowers, but in the pots and watering cans and tools you will see on garden centre shelves. Fill these bold containers with large-leafed tropicals, which are great accents for pools, patios and decks. It will be a vibrant season!

Flowering Shrubs

• Denis is most looking forward to a resurgence in flowering shrubs in 2015. "As a landscape designer, I was always keen on flowering shurbs in a garden," he says. "They are great structure and architectural plants. If you plan it right, you will get colour from spring to fall. They were disappearing about 10 years ago, but now they are coming back. The selection is going to be wonderful this year."
